

Disabled Enabled: Transcript (60 seconds version)

Visual

Audio

We open on an exterior of an office building. Cut to a woman sitting at her desk. She speaks to camera.

Graphic on calculator: **Disabled**

Cut to her working through a pile of paper work.

Graphic reads: **Enabled**

Cut to a bricklayer wearing a hard hat and working on a building site.

Sign on board: **Disabled**

We cut to him pouring a cup of tea from his thermos flask.

Sign reads: **Enabled**

Cut to a woman working inside a mini market shop.

Conveyor belt divider reads: **Disabled**

Cut to her serving customers and chatting to them with her manager smiling in the background.

Divider reads: **Enabled**

Cut to a man struggling up stairs.

Cut to the manager of the mini market as he explains how the adjustments can benefit everyone.

Woman: I'm an accountant and I'm visually impaired.

So to help me my office supplies all my paperwork in large print.

Man: I'm a builder and I have diabetes.

My boss lets me have a few short breaks during the day so that I can manage my blood glucose levels.

Woman: I'm a shop assistant and I'm a wheelchair user.

My boss lowered my cash desk so I could work comfortably.

Man: I work in IT. My office is on the 3rd floor. I have arthritis so these stairs can sometimes be a bit tough.

All my boss needs to do is to put my desk on the ground floor.

Manager: As employers we can all make reasonable adjustments to help our employees and customers who are disabled.

We cut to various scenarios of the previously featured people showing the changes that have been implemented and how they can make their working lives better.

Cut to see IT man reaching the top of the stairs, pauses and looks to camera.

They needn't be expensive or time-consuming to implement.

Female voiceover: Sometimes it's the smallest changes that make the biggest difference.
